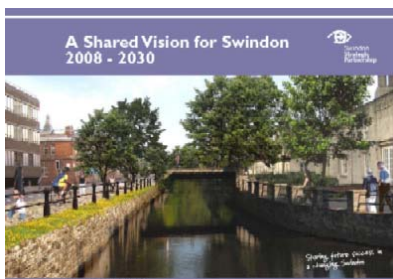

Connecting People Connecting Places



Connecting People Connecting Places is moving forward with 6 of the 7 clusters appointing a cluster chair and meetings being held in all areas with Councillors, community groups and other members of the public. Here is a very brief outline of activities that have been taking place.

West - Building on the successes of the existing area forum meetings discussions are being held around policing, streetsmart and refurbishments of playgrounds in the area. Cllr Nick Martin has been elected as cluster chair.

North - The north cluster held a cluster meeting on the theme of leisure and free time on 13th of July. Stands included plans for Moulden Hills Country Park, leisure centres, play areas, libraries, childrens summer camps, museums, cycle paths. The meeting was held at the Tawny Owl pub. The next themed meeting will be 'Independence and well-being". Cllr Justin Tomlinson will be the North Cluster Chair.

North Central - Regular monthly cluster meetings are being held with ward councillors, and other meetings are taking place relating to education and streetsmart. The cluster is putting in place a forum meeting in September with a 'Health' theme. Representatives from health related public sector providers will be available to talk to the community about their issues and concerns. Cllr Kevin Small has been elected cluster chair.

East - Councillors are meeting regularly and the cluster lead is attending community meetings to discuss CPCP. East Cluster is busy organising a community 'Big Lunch' at Liden community centre in-line with the national initiative followed the next day by a community 'Big Meeting' to uncover local priorities. Cllr Kevin Parry has been elected as cluster chair.

Town Centre - People in the Town Centre are keen to discuss issues around Queen's Park, car parking and school places. The Cluster lead has held meetings with ward councillors and existing community groups and representatives. A meeting to discuss school places with representatives from Children Services is being held on 15th July. Cllr David Wood has been elected cluster chair.

South - The Cluster Lead has been meeting with Ward and Parish Councillors to discuss CPCP and key local issues and priorities including health, education, crime and highways. The South Cluster is holding a 'meet and greet' event for councillors and representatives of existing community groups at the end of July. Cllr Andrew Bennett will be the South Cluster Chair.

North East - The North East Cluster lead has been meeting with ward members and other community leaders to discuss CPCP. As Director of Integrated Children and Young People Services she has also been considering the link between integrated children's services and cluster working. Issues in the North East cluster include provision of allotments and streetsmart issues. A cluster chair will be appointed in July.

Help if you are out of work

Support when you need it

Don't panic If you've lost your job or are facing redundancy ... a lot of support is available to help you. In many cases advice sessions for people facing redundancy are organised by employers working with JobcentrePlus. These sessions offer a chance to find out about the range of different benefits available and how to access them. Even when these sessions are not formally arranged, JobcentrePlus, and a number of other agencies can help you in a number of ways. For contact details see the Jobseeker Contact List below.

Local libraries can also be a very useful resource for all sorts of advice and support. Access to the internet is available at most libraries and many websites (including job and business-related sites) are free to access. Please visit your local library or check out our Libraries web pages for more information.

If you run into money difficulties, there are a number of organisations who can help, particularly if you need advice about how to manage your debts. It is important that you try and address these issues as soon as you possibly can. A list of useful organisations that can help is provided in the money advice section.

Jobseeker's Allowance

Jobseeker's Allowance is the main benefit for people who are out of work. If you are eligible it is paid when you don't have a job and are looking for work.

There are 2 types of Jobseeker's Allowance:

- The first is called 'Contribution-based Jobseeker's Allowance'. You may get this if you have paid or been credited with class 1 National Insurance contributions in the relevant tax years.
- The other is based on your income and savings. This is called 'Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance'.

NI 186: reduction in CO2 emissions in Local Authority area

One Planet Swindon

A Sustainability Event was held at the STEAM museum on Monday 13th July which saw an introduction from Kevin McCloud and world class speakers from BioRegional, Urban Initiatives, Hab Housing, Swindon Climate Action Network and other interested parties. The event attracted a large audience from local businesses including the New Swindon Company, Parish Councillors, local Councillors and senior staff from Swindon Borough Council.

The event highlighted the work that Swindon Borough Council are doing around the Sustainability agenda and began a series of practical conversations that will help agree Swindon's sustainability priorities and translate them into a focused approach to delivery by a range of partners. This will include the consideration of BioRegional's One Planet Living principles in future policy and planning.

Swindon Borough Council has a regional and national reputation for undertaking a wide range of sustainability initiatives, many of which are leading practice and are already improving outcomes, including:

- The Swindon Standard which includes a requirement for 20% renewable or sustainable energy production on-site for all major developments to ensure that sustainability is an integral part of the roll out of Swindon as a growth point.
- The highly sustainable homes to be built in Swindon, in partnership with Kevin McCloud's HAB homes, will see Swindon recognised nationally for its work on sustainable development.
- Strong waste reduction and recycling performance against targets for 2010 such as recycle, compost or treat 50% household waste, and extend kerbside recycling collections to include every home in the borough.
- A sustainable approach to procurement to shape the market is being adopted to facilitate sustainable development in the town centre and stimulate the demand for sustainable technologies.
- Through the Swindon Strategic Partnership, Environmental Sustainability is one of the five blocks reporting to and with membership on the Swindon Strategic Partnership Board. The Block manages the five environmental sustainability improvement targets within Swindon's Local Area Agreement, each of which has a Delivery Plan, including NI 186 (reduction in Swindon's carbon emissions). The Block is supported by the Climate Change Steering Group and its Climate Change Action Plan.

This event shows the continuing commitment of Swindon's organisations and communities to promoting sustainable development.

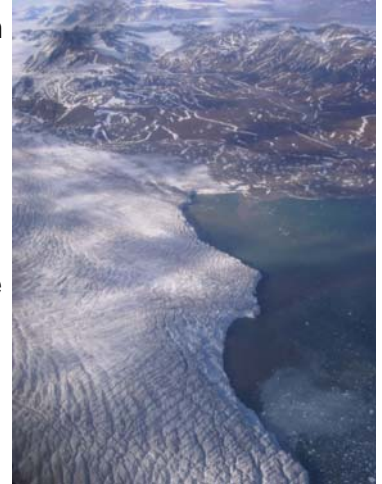

Climate change and the over 50s

The age 50+ sector currently represents 33% of the UK population and this will rise to approximately 40% by 2030. Recent academic studies have demonstrated that they have the highest carbon footprint of any other age group in the UK. While being part of the problem, the over 50's also consider themselves to be the missing voice in the environmental debate and commonly want to do something to help. However the vast amount of complex, confusing and often contradictory information and advice means that they do not know what to do for the best.

One year of funding from Swindon Borough Council's Community Grants Scheme is allowing Community Service Volunteers (CSV) Retired and Senior Volunteer Programme (RSVP) to develop direct interaction with individuals and a range of community groups. Local RSVP volunteers, led by Dave Brown, are currently identifying target audiences throughout the Borough who will be offered the opportunity of a short (10 minute), presentation to introduce the issues with a view to stimulating discussion on opportunities for reducing their carbon footprint. Any subsequent interest, or desire from individuals or groups to pursue specific courses of action, will be encouraged, assisted and supported by RSVP.

The Festival of Sport, organised by Swindon Borough Council's Leisure Services and sponsored by Triumph, took place on Saturday 30th and Sunday 31st May. The weekend was packed full of sports tournaments and activities for the whole community to enjoy.



Saturday 30th May

Across the Borough, over 750 people took part in the various sport tournaments. It's-a-Knockout proved particularly popular, along with tag rugby, men's 6-a-side football, ladies 5-a-side football, volleyball, archery, netball, boccia, angling, tennis, badminton and squash.

Sunday 31st May

Coate Water: Free Family Activity Day

A whole host of free activities were on offer at Coate Water Country Park including woodland games; tai chi; beach volleyball; sailing; kayaking; rowing; basketball shots; rollpaluzza bike challenge; croquet; archery; tri-golf; Nordic walking, football skills, face painting and bouncy castles.

Local sports clubs provided many of the activities to promote pathways in to sport. A mixture of excellent activities and glorious sunshine attracted in excess of 2,000 to the park. Bob Sharman, Senior Ranger commented, that in all the years he has been at Coate Water, he has never seen so many people there.

Parachallenge 2009

A mixture of sports were on offer including Powerchair football, tennis, frisbee golf, ability bikes and climbing, and teams came from as far afield as Nottingham, Cornwall and London to take part.

Mayor, David Wren tried out one of the ability bikes. Organised by Leisure Services and sponsored by Nationwide, the event helps raise awareness of the facilities Swindon has to offer disabled people.

Paralympian Athlete, Ben Rushgrove, who recently won gold in 100m at the Paralympic World Cup in Manchester attended and closed the event with an inspirational speech.

FA Charter Award

The day also saw the Wiltshire FA present local football team, Swindon Rockets, with a Charter Standard Award. Swindon Rockets wheelchair football team are one of the first

disabled football teams in the country to win this award.

Ability Sports Development Officer, Ben Humphrey said "We are ahead in disability sport. We are one of the first clubs to get a Charter Standard, and actually we are teaching the FA a lot about how it is done, so to be part of that is amazing."



Access Days

Access Days, organised by Leisure Services and Education Support Services, are multi-sports events for children with disabilities. The events provide children with the opportunity to take part in a range of different indoor and outdoor sports and activities that they wouldn't ordinarily have open access to. All special needs and mainstream schools are invited. At the February event we had 179 children from 30 different schools take part and are expecting the same numbers for the Summer event on 1st July at the County Ground Athletics Track.

We have recently secured funding from the Schools Sports Partnership that will allow us to add an October Access Day to the programme. We have 5 volunteers from SBC helping at the July event and are always well supported by Churchfields and Greendown secondary schools who allow their Year 10 students to volunteer as part of their Community Sports Leaders Award.

Swindon Cycling Festival

The Cycling Festival took place one Sunday 14th June at Lydiard Park. Visitors were able to try out a range of bikes, find out about safe cycling, meet others interested in cycling, get a free bike check, and take part in cycling activities.

Warm Zone comes to Swindon!

Funding has been secured from Healthy Communities & Older Peoples Partnership (HCOPP) Board to run a pilot 'Warm Zone' in Swindon. This is an 18-month project to help alleviate fuel poverty across the Borough. It will cover 2 wards:

1. Walcot – starting September 2009
2. Gorsehill & Pinehurst – starting mid Jan 2010

The project will help achieve a number of LAA priorities including:

- NI 139 – through maximising income and welfare benefits take up
- NI 120 – through a reduction in excess winter deaths
- NI 134 – through a reduction in the number of emergency bed days from cold related illnesses
- NI 187 & 186 – through an increase in take up of insulation and heating grants

Helen Sanderson, Affordable Warmth Co-ordinator at Swindon Borough Council, is managing the scheme.

It is an area-based approach to tackling fuel poverty and focuses on door-to-door assessments being undertaken to identify households in need whilst developing the most appropriate package of measures. Income maximisation will be central to the project enabling fuel poverty to be tackled, along with uptake of energy efficiency grants, which has a proven positive impact on health.

The scheme looks at 2 main things:

1. Are homes properly insulated?
2. Are householders claiming all the income they are entitled to?

The pilot will begin in Walcot ward in September '09 with every householder being contacted about a range of new grants available for insulation and advice about maximising their income. We will be working with the local community to promote the scheme ensure the success of the project.

By better insulating homes and claiming all the benefits they are entitled to, people will save money on their fuel bills and be able to keep warm next winter.

“The cost of gas and electricity has almost doubled since 1993 and many people will either not keep warm enough or struggle to be able to afford their fuel bills” This project

help ensure that residents are better prepared in case of another cold winter said Cllr Renard, Swindon Borough Council cabinet member for Health, Housing and Adult Social Care

We will be working closely with local advice agencies such as the CAB and The Pensions Service along with reputable insulation contractors to make the project a success.



The Warm Zone approach has been used successfully across the Country to help thousands of people increase their income and properly insulate their homes.

Street Athletics is a very simple and highly effective community focussed youth engagement programme created by Olympic Gold Medallists Linford Christie and Darren Campbell. The programme is targeted at disengaged, disaffected, low self esteem young people aged under 20.

It targets youngsters who are not engaged in mainstream sports.

Linford and Darren are at each Street Athletics event to encourage local people to get involved. The main element of the programme is a 60m sprint, where any young person can participate. This results in a series of Finals where the top three boys and girls in each age group (U13/15/17/20) are invited to attend the Grand Final.

In addition to the 60m sprints, Street Athletics offers young people the opportunity to showcase their musical/dance talents in front of their peers and potentially at the Street Athletics Final in Manchester.

Swindon Tackles Drugs

The 'Keeping Swindon Safe' bus hit the streets during National Tackling Drugs Week, 8 - 12 June, to highlight awareness and action around drug misuse.

The bus stopped at various points across Swindon, including New College, giving people the chance to browse through displays, pick up leaflets, and chat to staff from the Community Safety Partnership (CSP).

Crime reduction, police enforcement and criminal justice activities were showcased, alongside community education, drug treatment and health awareness programmes.

Hundreds of residents spoke to experts from drug treatment agencies, the police, a local magistrate, and other organisations to answer queries and share concerns.

Matthew Hibbert, Strategic Development Manager of Substance Misuse, for the CSP, commented:

"We spoke to lots of people during the week about issues surrounding drug misuse. Hopefully, many more will have picked up advice and information via leaflets and displays, or will have been reassured about the year-round action that's being taken to tackle drug misuse locally."

A self-completion survey to assess residents' perceptions and opinions about drug misuse in their local area was carried out during the week. Results will help inform future local action plans to tackle drugs.

Ways to beat the burglars

People in Swindon are being asked to Beat the Burglar by following simple advice from the town's Community Safety Partnership.

The advice comes as part of the Lock It or Lose It Campaign, which has been launched following statistics that show that 9 out of 10 burglaries are opportunistic, due to people leaving windows and doors unlocked in their homes.

Richard Palusinski, the head of the CSP, said: 'With summer here, there is an increased risk of people allowing burglars into their homes by leaving doors and windows open.

"Just take a moment to look at your home through a burglar's eyes to see ways in which a thief could gain access to your house."

Advice for householders includes closing and locking doors and windows; keeping sheds, garages and gates locked; investing in a visible burglar alarm; keeping valuables out of sight and marking valuables with a postcode using a UV pen.

Superintendent Kier Pritchard, of Swindon Police, said: 'We will be working with our partner agencies to target activity at car boot sales, garage sales, licensed premises, second hand shops, food outlets and other locations to recover stolen property.'
